

## TAMPA/YBOR CITY STREETCARS

In a previous newsletter we featured the "Bethlehem Central RR" of Dothan Alabama, The owner Tom Ruddell was instrumental in the return of streetcars to Tampa when he lived there. The following is an article by Bruce Nord who travelled

# there earlier this year. TAMPA'S REPLICA STREETCARS

The streetcar system of Tampa, Florida began in 1892, reached a peak of importance in the 1920's and ceased operations in August of 1946. No doubt the closing was considered a progressive measure at the time, but

gradually there was reconsideration and streetcars began operating again in 2001. The total length extends to only 2.4 miles, but they are an interesting 2.4 miles. Everything about the project is well-done and a one-third mile addition is to open this December (2010) with the possibility of further

additions in the future. The eight cars in service are replicas, not rebuilds, and they are really quite magnificent. Everything about them gleams, the outside, the inside, the plentiful woodwork and the metalwork. If someone out of mischief told you that the first day of operations was yesterday you might be inclined to believe. Obviously those making this project work, take pride in what they are doing. Modellers who regard weathering as the crowning touch may experience some disappointment. Those most familiar with the TTC, especially when visiting in winter months, may notice the lack of dirty snow-melt from passengers' boots, which runs to inches apart. Power poles

the back on start-up, and forward coming to a stop, making for an enduring memory and an illusion of basic Newtonian physics. The cars are replicas of the Birney Safety type, about which I claim to know nothing except that they closely resemble the Bachmann offering many of us own. I don't think the TTC had any but the speed controllers on older models that they did operate, were certainly similar, and hence the movements of the motormen were similar. Controls are duplicated at each end, seatbacks flip over and there are no loops in the trackwork. There are two powerlines overhead spaced about eight

must trail of course. Change of direction procedures involve bringing down the power pole no longer to be in use, by means of its rope, and putting the opposite pole into use on the other power line. Poles must be moved to get the right polarity you might say. Never thought of it before but this must have happened at Sutton (Ontario) and at North Toronto station.

The trackwork of excellent quality, is partly single line, partly double. There are considerable lengths of two way trackage and there are passing tracks of minimal length. The street car tracks crosses a railway track at right angles.



While walking about Ybor City, we observed an Amtrack train departing Tampa Union Station which is about a mile west of Ybor City. I also observed that motormen were extra attentive about their interlocking signal and found that reassuring.

The 2.4 miles divides itself into three sections: Downtown, channelside, and Ybor City.

Downtown serves a sport arena, a history of the Tampa area museum, a convention centre and an aquarium. These are all large and impressive structures. There is also a cargo ship on display as a museum but not visible from the streetcar.

Two floating drydocks of moderate size could be observed from the streetcar in the Channelside area. Ybor City was founded by Vicente Ybor over a century ago as a centre for hand-rolling cigars. It was a company town inspired by a degree of idealism. Workers, almost entirely of Cuban, Greek or Italian origin could make a decent living on a piecework basis. They could come and go as they pleased. Workers contributed something like a dime a week to engage a reader, who sat on a slightly elevated platform and read the news and classics of latin literature. These workers were the residents of Ybor City and gave it its distinctive flavour.

I have emphasized that the streetcars in present use are replicas. There is a streetcar society which has an original Birney to work on so that is an example of reconstruction.

At the Downtown end of the streetcar line, there is a connection with so



Called "trams or trolleys", which are really buses pretending to be something else, and gain nothing by the pretense, so might be termed shams or simply mistakes.

In Ybor City we had lunch in an Italian restaurant, in business since 1948. No doubt they had upgraded for handling of cash and cards, but the décor and ambiance and style of service, appeared unchanged since 1948 (if they said 1908)
